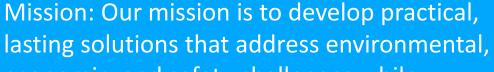

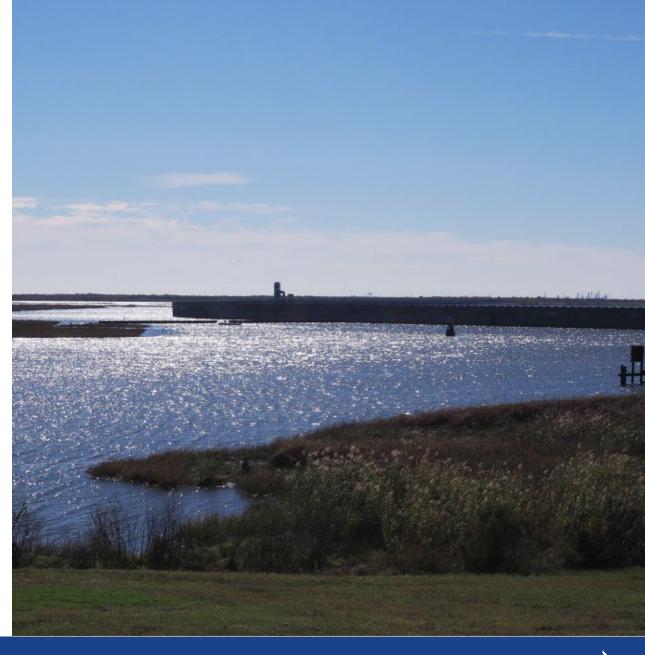

Community-Led Green Infrastructure Grantmaking Program Objectives

- Increase the resiliency of Southeast Louisiana communities by implementing of at least 12 stormwater and flood mitigation improvement projects through two rounds of grantmaking.
- Ensure that at least 12 grantees have improved their abilities to identify, successfully apply for, and effectively manage grants related to water quality improvement, and prevention, reduction, and/or elimination of pollution in BIPOC and other underserved communities that are adversely and disproportionately affected by environmental and human health harms or risks.
- Increase the number of individuals with improved understanding of environmental issues in their community.

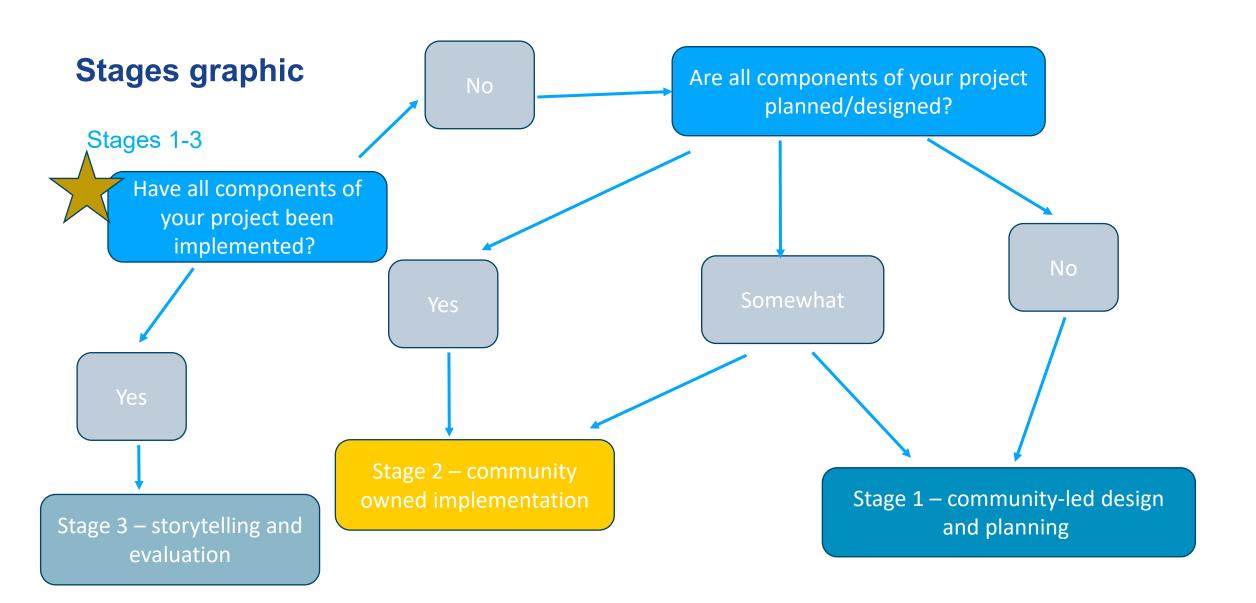


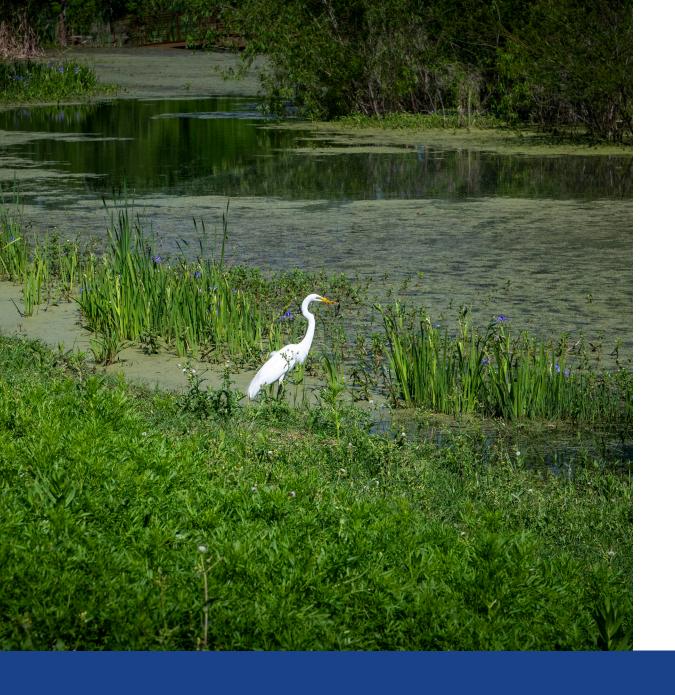
Grants for Projects in Various Stages

Stage 1: Community-Led Design & Planning: Six subawards of \$50,000 each to support the design and planning of green infrastructure projects.

Stage 2: Community-Owned Implementation: Eight subawards of \$150,000 each to support the implementation of green infrastructure projects led by and for BIPOC and underserved communities.

Stage 3: Community Evaluation & Storytelling: Four grants of \$62,500 each to green infrastructure demonstration projects that are well underway or recently completed to support evaluation and communications about their impact.





Application Information

- Eligible Parishes: Assumption, Jefferson, Orleans, Lafourche, Plaquemines, St. Bernard, St. Charles, St. James, St. John, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, Terrebonne, Washingt on
- Application Deadline: October 24th
 - Round 1 awardees will be notified in December 2025 with the grant period beginning mid-January 2026
 - Round 2 applications will open infall 2026
- Awardee requirements:
 - Quarterly reporting
 - Participation in Community of Practice
 - Compliance with all Federal regulations

What is green infrastructure

Defining, examples

- Moving water from a less desirable location to a more desirable location by mimicking nature
- Considers multiple benefits (ex: manages water, reduces flooding, looks nice, is a public space to enjoy, improves water quality, provides habitat, reduces heat island effect, etc.)
- Examples include
 - Rain gardens
 - Permeable pavers
 - French drains
 - Bioswales
 - And more

What is technical assistance?

Getting support for your application

- Technical assistance (TA) is support and guidance that is provided to support you with the development of your application. Examples include:
 - Organizational readiness
 - UEI/Sam.gov registration support
 - Policy and procedures in alignment with federal standards and the Code of Federal Regulations
- Application development
 - Ideation/brainstorming for your application
 - Resources/guidance for technical aspects
 - Budget review
 - Application review for consistency with scoring criteria
- What we <u>can't</u> do is write your application or budget for you



Opportunities for technical assistance (TA)

Virtual

- Introductory sessions (like this one)
 - Purpose: Introduce the grant and tell you how to participate in TA
- Virtual Office Hours
 - Purpose: Weekly time to come and get support/listen to the support others are getting
 - Weekly on Mondays from 10:30 to 11:30 am
- Virtual training sessions
 - Purpose: Grow participants skills to support development of their application and set expectations for post-award requirements
 - Grant prospecting Sept. 11 from 1 to 2:30 pm
 - Grant writing Sept. 15 from 1 to 2:30 pm
 - Reporting Sept. 30 from 10 to 11:30 am
 - Financial management Oct. 6 from 12 to 1:30 pm
- Virtual 1:1 session
 - Purpose: Register in advance for tailored technical assistance
 - Six 30-minute 1:1 slots are available each week

What to know to get started on your application

What to expect

Application

- Filled out in Foundant portal
- Questions you'll be asked
 - Quick pitch section
 - Title, project description, amount requested
 - Org basics section
 - Name, contact information, name, mission, year established, number of staff and volunteers
 - The project section
 - Describe the needs your project will address, which stage you're applying for, description, impacts, logic model, indicators, feasibility, engagement framework and documentation, long term operations, land use requirements, community access, community description, project area
 - The Impact section provides evidence that your project will work

What to expect

Application

- Questions you'll be asked
 - Award plan and budget section
 - Technical assistance needs, timeline, milestones, budget narrative, budget
 - Organizational capacity section
 - Core capabilities, past experience, partners, resumes, organization identification number, operating budget, financial statement, liability insurance, board of directors list, 990, executive director and board approval

Requirements

Applications

- Be a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization with a defined community mission or a project fiscally sponsored by a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization
- Be located in, or demonstrate a strong track record of working with, vulnerable or underserved communities in the region
- Demonstrate experience with green infrastructure and community collaboration
- Ensure capacity to participate in technical assistance and the Community of Practice
- Have a Unique Entity Identifier and registration with SAM.gov If you do not have a Unique Entity Identifier, preaward technical assistance will be available to help you obtain one
- □ Have written policy and procedures in alignment with federal standards and the Code of Federal Regulations; *Please note that preaward technical assistance will support in the development of these policies for organizations that do not already have them in place
- Be able to provide documentation of liability and workers' compensation insurance
- Applicants participate in technical assistance

Next steps

First steps to take

- Determine eligibility
 - Review eligibility requirements
 - Ensure Sam.gov registration is current
 - See if your organization has a UEI, if not register for one
 - ☐ If you do not have a UEI, make sure you have the required documents to get one
- Determine capacity to apply and implement
 - Review application requirements
 - Review reporting requirements
 - Consider project staff capacity to implement
 - □ Start your organization's internal process for accepting a federal award (for example get board approval)
- Stay informed
 - ☐Sign up for updates
 - □Sign up for technical assistance
